TACTICAL TIPS + TRICKS: <u>Positional Ideas In Chess #1</u> <u>Get your pieces into a good position</u>

Hi everyone. You might have heard people talk about "tactical chess" and "positional chess" before. But what does each form of chess actually mean and how can <u>BOTH</u> help us to win our chess games? Tactical chess is what helps us to win pieces, often giving us a clear advantage. Things like forks (or double attacks), pins (making opponent's pieces get stuck), skewers (forcing stronger pieces or the King to sidestep attacks leaving vulnerable pieces that we can take behind) and so on. But positional chess can be described as really what sets such tactics up in the first place. There can be no tactics, unless you get your pieces into a good position after all. And how do we get our pieces in a good position? The simplest answer is if they control lots of space and
