Positional Ideas In Chess #5

Hi everyone. I know we've covered this before throughout RNF history and it's been even one of the big themes in every newsletter actually. That is, even if it's not expressly talked about. But one of the biggest ways to get an advantage in any chess game, is to take advantage of lined up pieces. And this means exactly like it sounds. Pieces that are on the same file (lines going up and down the board- the letters), rank (lines going across the board- the numbers) or diagonals (lines going diagonally, named from their starting square to ending square). Whether your opponent's pieces are on the same line so you can pin them (make a weaker or less important piece stuck blocking an attack), skewer them (which is a reverse pin) or fork/double attack the m
